Nicholas Thieberger established the Pilbara Aboriginal Language Centre in Port Hedland in the late 1980s, then built the Aboriginal Studies Electronic Data Archive at AIATSIS in the early 1990s. He worked at the Vanuatu Cultural Centre and went on to write a grammar of South Efate, a language from central Vanuatu with which he continues to work. In 2003 he helped establish the Pacific and Regional Archive for Digital Sources in Endangered Cultures (<a href="http://paradisec.org.au">http://paradisec.org.au</a>), a digital archive of mainly audio language and music records, and is now its Director. He is a cofounder and co-director of the Resource Network for Linguistic Diversity (RNLD) and in 2008 he established a <a href="linguistic archive">linguistic archive</a> at the University of Hawai'i. He is interested in developments in digital humanities methods and their potential to improve research practice and he is now developing methods for creation of reusable data sets from fieldwork on previously unrecorded languages. He is the editor of the journal <a href="Language Documentation & Conservation">Language Documentation & Conservation</a>. He edited <a href="The Oxford Handbook of Linguistic Fieldwork">The Oxford Handbook of Linguistic Fieldwork</a> (2102). He taught in the Department of Linguistics at the University of Hawai'i at Manoa and is an Australian Research Council QEII Fellow at the University of Melbourne, Australia. In 2014 he is also a Ludwig Leichhardt Jubilee Fellow of the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation based at the University of Cologne.

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
